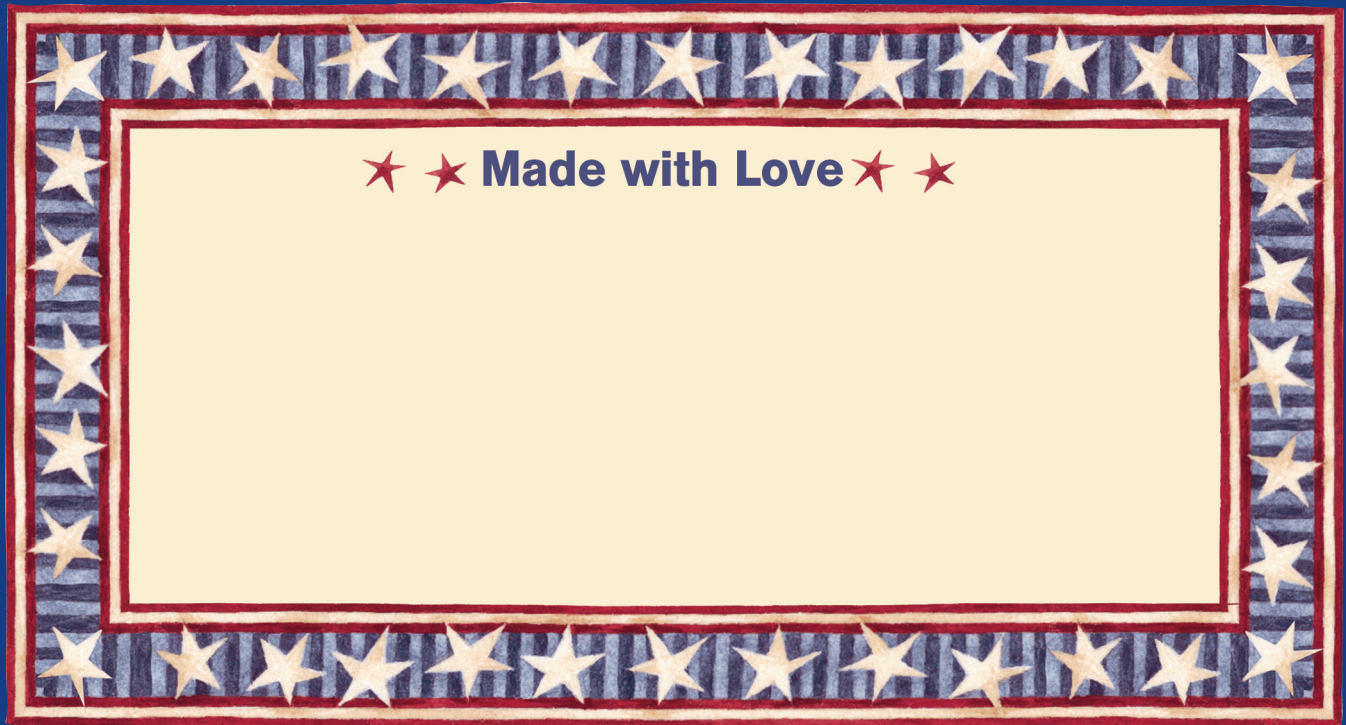


# Quilters Care

• • • by Labeling their Quilts

Attaching a label to your donation quilt will give you the opportunity to send a message of encouragement to the recipient as well as serve to personalize the quilt. From the label the recipient will know who pieced the quilt, when and where it was made, who quilted the quilt and any other information that you may want to include. A label also serves as historical documentation for the quilt letting future generations know who made it and why it was made.



## Permanent Marking Pens

You can write directly onto your cloth label with a permanent marker like Pigma Micron Pens. Place cloth label on a piece of sandpaper to hold it in place while writing.

## Embroidery

Hand or machine embroider your label.

## Computer Generated Labels

In this transfer print procedure the label is designed on your computer and printed directly onto special fabric sheets using an inkjet printer. There are several different manufacturers that offer 100% cotton, silk, and poplin fabric sheets. Pay close attention to the finishing process to set the color, if not set properly the color can wash out.

## Copier Label

To use label above, ask your local copier shop to print a mirror image copy of the label onto photo transfer paper. Follow directions on the paper to transfer the image to your fabric. Write information onto label using a pigma pen.

Hand appliquéd label to the back of quilt. Many quilters affix the label before quilting so that it becomes a permanent part of the quilt.

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
